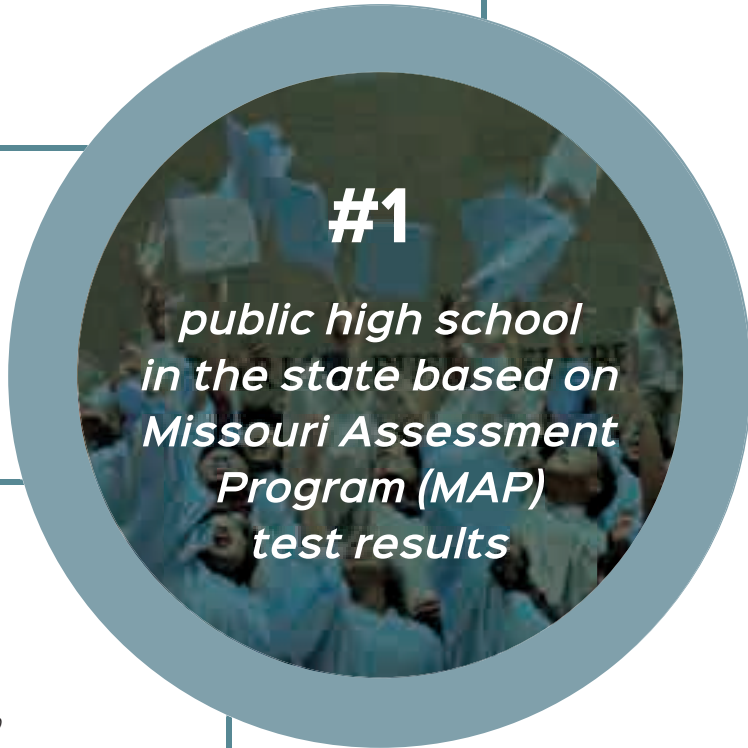

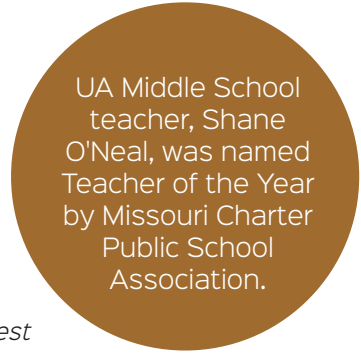

Along with rigorous academics, these opportunities have made UA one of the best open admissions college-preparatory schools in the country.

The 2015-2016 year at University Academy was arguably the best in the history of the school. Based on State of Missouri test scores, University Academy's High School was ranked #1 out of 397 public high schools in Missouri. Additionally, University Academy received a 100% Annual Performance Report (APR) score from the State of Missouri. University Academy's High School was also recognized for excellence by U.S. News & World Report for the fifth year in a row. Finally, The National Title I Association named University Academy a National Title I Distinguished School, an honor that is given to only two schools in each state.

In addition to supporting special programs and opportunities for UA students, Friends of UA operates an innovative and one-of-a-kind Alumni Success Program which helps our alumni through college and into their careers. UA's rigorous college-preparatory academics combined with special opportunities and the Alumni Success Program is making a huge difference. Measured six years after high school graduation, University Academy alumni have earned bachelor's degrees at more than five times the rate of our nation's lowest income students.

The work Friends of UA and University Academy are doing is incredibly important, not just for our students and alumni, but also for Kansas City. Together we are proving what is possible and creating a competitive educational landscape in Kansas City where students and the community are winners.

UA Wellness Center Operated by Children's Mercy

Many thanks to the Baptist-Trinity Lutheran Legacy Foundation, Arvin Gottlieb Charitable Foundation, and Jewish Community Foundation-Sam & Lucy Gould Fund, as well as an anonymous donor, for funding the UA Wellness Center.

In July 2016, The UA Wellness Center received approval from Children's Mercy Hospital for a Quality Improvement project titled "Telehealth at a School Based Health Center."

This new technology allows parents to participate in visits at the UA Wellness Center via video conferencing in an effort to improve communication with parents and increase parent satisfaction.

STUDY ABROAD & WILDERNESS SUMMER PROGRAMS

Friends of UA provides inspiring outdoor and study abroad experiences that make a difference. Students build social capital with life-changing impact, and college graduation rates are significantly higher for participants in the programs than non-participants.

Impact on Graduation & Scholarships

68% of students from the 2002-2010 classes, who participated in summer study abroad programs while in high school have since graduated from – or are currently enrolled in – college compared to 48% of non-program participants.

Additionally, participants from the Class of 2016 received 2.7 times more dollars in scholarships than non-program participants.

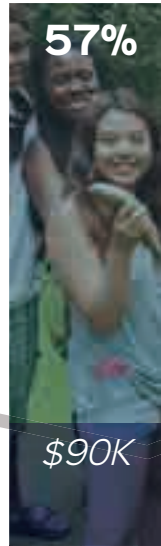

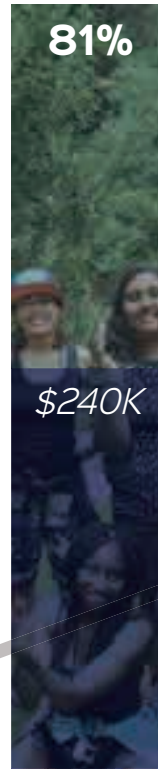
College graduation & enrollment rates, Classes of 2011-2015.

Summer Program participation rates tripled from 14% in the Classes of 2004-10, to 44% in the Class of 2016. More impressive are the numbers from this year's Class of 2017, with a 71% participation rate, the highest since the program began.

As a first-generation and low-income student, I had no idea how I would make it to and through college. Many of the University Academy faculty and teachers were very helpful in encouraging me to do my best work in school and inspired me to further my education. In May, I earned my B.A. in Medical Anthropology with a double minor in Sociology and Criminal Justice Policy. I currently work as an office staff assistant and tutor coordinator for the Creighton University TRIO Upward Bound Programs, and I am a Behavioral Health Specialist Intern for the Children's Respite Care Center (CRCC) in Omaha, Nebraska. Following graduation and through the summer, I continued as a full-time behavioral health specialist for CRCC.

UA always taught me to be a leader, whether in class or in the community, and I have carried that with me throughout my undergrad experience. I served as the treasurer and president of the Creighton University African American Student Association, the parliamentarian and president of the Association of Multicultural Greek Organization, and the student representative of the Black Studies Department. I was initiated in Delta Sigma Theta in April 2013 where I served as the treasurer, vice-president, and the current president of the Omaha chapter. Because of my collegiate involvement, I was the recipient of the 2016 Rev. N. Thomas Schloemer, S.J. Outstanding Leadership Award and Creighton University's Office of Multicultural Affairs Volunteer of the Year award.

This fall, I began my Masters of Social Work at Barry University in Miami Shores, Florida. My ultimate goal is to be a federal probations officer while establishing a rehabilitation and second chance foundation for felons re-entering society after incarceration.

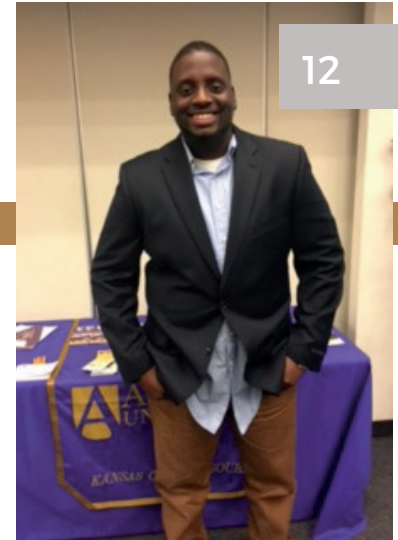

UA and Hyman Brand Hebrew Academy students were highlighted on KCUR's Up to Date where they were interviewed about their Civil Rights Tour of the South.

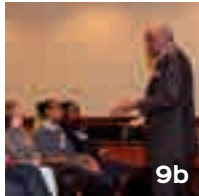

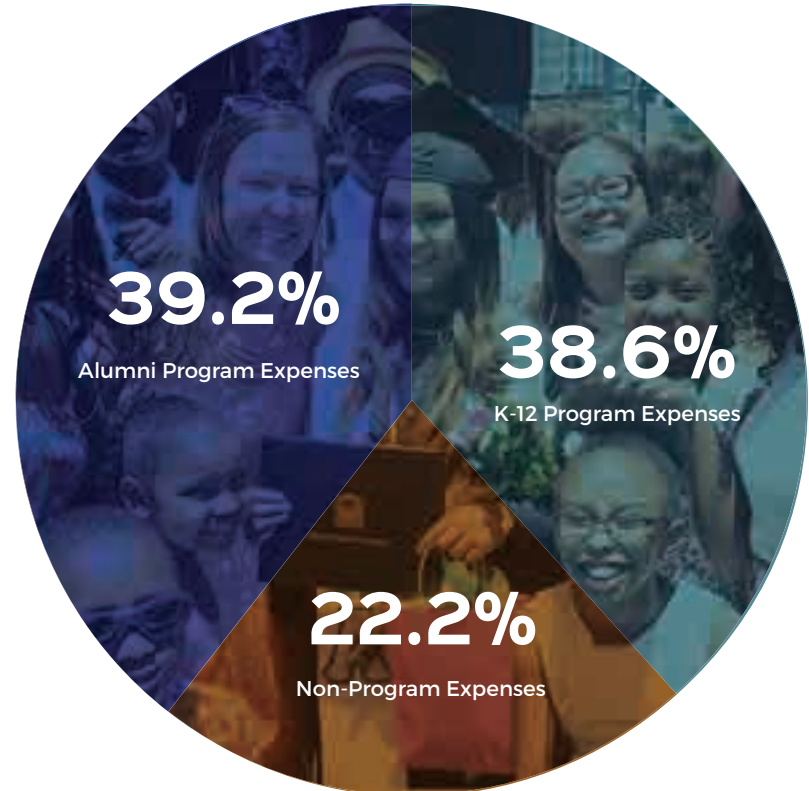
